WHY

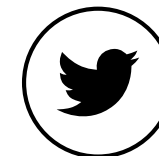
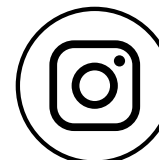
The EquAlley project aims to confront gender stereotypes, address social injustice, and combat gender-based violent behavior, particularly in public spaces among youngsters.

BOOKLET

A brochure on street harassment as a form of gender-based violence, gender roles and stereotypes and education on this topic in schools is available on the project website. The brochure is based on focus groups held with educators in each partner country. Teaching schoolchildren about the specific issues of street harassment is an innovative approach and a lens for combating gender inequalities and, as far as we know, has received very little attention in educational programmes.

The project is now finalised and all three outputs can be downloaded from our website! All materials are in the project's official languages: English, Portuguese, Spanish, Dutch, Italian and Polish.

COURSE

The course is centred on the goal of raising awareness, preventing and decreasing discriminatory behaviour and attitudes, giving tools on how to deal with such behaviour and attitudes, as well as breaking away from normative and stereotypical gender roles and views. This two-dimensional approach is innovative in itself and the first to include the important aspect of street harassment specifically in educational programmes on gender inequality.



GUIDE

The educator's guide to facilitating the course is designed for educators working with children aged 12 to 16 and will serve as a support and aid for running the course. The guide includes all the essential activities of the course, but also important information on the topic of gender roles, norms and stereotypes, as well as street harassment as a form of gender-based violence (for example, information gathered through the discussion groups, as well as a glossary).
