Tackling street harassment and gender stereotypes in youngsters

The EquAlley project is a 24 month school education project funded by the Erasmus+ program of the European Commission with partners from Spain, Portugal, Italy, Netherlands and Poland. It sets out to challenge gender stereotypes, social injustice and gender-based violent behaviour, particularly in public spaces, in youngsters. This will be done by promoting and encouraging youngsters to re-think gender roles, norms and stereotypes through a blended-learning course offered in institutions working with youth (schools, youth centers, sports clubs...). Through pilot actions and training activities with educators themselves, the EquAlley team will develop highly relevant and valuable resources, supporting and encouraging educators to include these crucial topics in their learning experiences.

The EquAlley Booklet



The EquAlley booklet offers an innovative insights on "Street Harassment in Europe" as a form of gendered violence, gender roles & stereotypes and the education/interventions within schools. The booklet is the result of the qualitative data collected from educators in five countries (Spain, Poland, Italy, Netherlands, and Portugal) and include comprehensive literature and glossaries to enhance understanding of street harassment.

It focuses on 6 domains:

1. Definitions of Street Harassment

2. The shared historical roots of Street Harassment in Europe

- 3. In-depth Investigation and Research on Street Harassment
- 4. The Human rights issues of Street Harassment
- 5. The impact of Street Harassment on Young populations
- 6. Addressing Harassment in public spaces

Impact - Promoting the education of school children regarding street harassment, with a specific emphasis on educators' teaching, provides an innovative perspective for tackling gender inequalities and violence.





Learning, Teaching, Training Activities - 17th - 19th of October (Bilbao, Spain)

From 17th to 19th of October, we conducted a week-long series of activities in Bilbao, Spain. These activities were designed to address the following crucial topics:

• street harassment/sexual harassment

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- gender-based violence
- combatting stereotypes and normative gender roles
- self-empowerment



During these training activities, two educators from each partner's country actively engaged in learning and testing the activities of the course developed for young individuals aged 12-16. On the first day, educators learned the basics regarding gender norms, stereotypes, and street harassment as a form of gender-based violence. The course was particularly attentive to equipping educators with competencies and sensibilities related to diverse gender identities, encompassing gender fluidity, queerness, and non-binary genders. Over the next two days, we presented and tested the course and its activities to gather valuable feedback and evaluations.
